For the week of Aug. 7 to Aug. 13 there were 38 motor vehicle stops, three reports of loose dogs, one report of loose livestock and one inspection.

1428 – MT DOT called and stated that there was a tractor and drill sitting at the provided location for over a week. The tractor is gone but the drill isn't and is in the way of the caller. They want a deputy to come out and see if they can find the owner or a way to move it.

1459 – Caller stated that they think their neighbor is abusing their service dog. She stated that the dog's nails were curling and that they saw the dog getting kicked and dragged around. She provided the neighbor's name and apartment number. An officer showed up and the dog seemed fine.

1530 – Caller stated that he got a call from his daughter, stating there was a lot of yelling and a gunshot at her location. After the gunshot there was silence. A GPD officer arrived on the scene and is talking to one of the involved parties.

Friday, Aug. 11
1320 – Caller reported that their neighbor was smoking marijuana. The building does not allow the smoking of anything inside, and the person has been told this.

2059 – Caller reported that a truck with a yellow flashing light was at the listed location.

Saturday, Aug. 12
0211 – A public assist call was made about a man who was passed out. An officer arrived at the scene to find that he just had too much to drink. The man is walking home and the officer will patrol to make sure he makes it home safe.

1709 – Caller reported that there was a foreign sounding man calling her. He stated that he was with Windows and her system is down. The man called her seven times today trying to get her to download something. She stated that she was not going to and would call tech support about it. The number was from North Carolina and when asked the man said he was from India but based out of North Carolina. She blocked the number and reported it to law enforcement.

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
