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

Notice of Application and Intervention Deadline

1. On October 12, 2023, Montana-Dakota Utilities ("MDU"), filed with the Montana Public Service Commission ("Commission") its Request for Approval to Update Power Purchase Time Differentiated Rate 93 Tariff ("Application").

2. MDU Rate 93 is a standard rate tariff available to qualifying facilities ("QFs") that produce three megawatts or less in nameplate capacity. MDU proposes changes to its differentiated energy purchase rates under its Rate 93 Tariff to reflect an increase in forecasted Midcontinent Independent System Operator, Inc. ("MISO") market prices. For the on-peak energy, MDU proposes to decrease the time differentiated energy purchase rate from \$0.02870 per kilowatt hour ("Kwh") to \$0.02806 per Kwh. For off-peak energy, MDU proposes to increase the rate from \$0.02688 per Kwh to \$0.02813 per Kwh. After the initial change in rates, MDU proposes to escalate the time differentiated energy purchase rates by three percent per year to reflect inflation. MDU also requests an increase in its monthly capacity payments to QFs from \$9.935 per kilowatt ("Kw") to \$10.367 per Kw, starting in 2031 and applicable for the remainder of the terms of the contracts MDU has entered.

4. The Commission invites any interested party affected by MDU's Application to intervene in this docket. To intervene, a party must file a petition to intervene with the Commission no later than NOVEMBER 10, 2023. Two recipes from my file were combined to pickle the beets. I used a sugar-substitute because I'm again in a session of the

Whole Life Challenge. There were four large beets while the rest were pingpong-ball-sized, so I boiled those large ones for 15 minutes before adding the rest to the pot. I saved the leaves for another meal or two:some in a salad and some steamed and doused with vinegar.

Ginger Beets plus Orange

12 medium beets

2 C cider vinegar

1 C sugar

1 (3/4") piece fresh ginger,

1 tablespoon peppercorns 1 orange, zested and squeezed

Wash and trim beets, leaving root and 1" stem intact. Put in large pot, cover with water, add 1-2 tsp salt. Bring to a boil, cover pot, lower heat and simmer until tender. Drain, rinse with cold water. Wearing gloves, slip skins from beets. Slice or quarter beets,
